Widely known tales such as "Snow White and the Seven Dwarves" and "Rumpelstiltskin" collected by the Grimm Brothers in the early 19th century, have become part of everyday culture and shapers of identities in many Western countries. A contemporary of the Brothers Grimm, Franz Xaver von Schönwerth tirelessly collected the folklore, legends, and fairytales of "ordinary folk" in the Upper Palatinate region of his native Bavaria and published them in the 1850s in a three-

volume scholarly work. The dual language book Original Bavarian Folktales: A Schönwerth Selection by M. Charlotte Wolf is the first English-German edition of these tales. The stories are fascinating testimonies of the beliefs and lives of people in southeastern Germany in the 1800s and before. In this lecture, M. Charlotte Wolf will talk about Schönwerth and his work as a collector of stories as well as her personal connection to and work with these tales.

M. Charlotte Wolf, Ph.D., was born and raised in Germany, and has lived in the United States for almost twenty years. Her studies in these countries have resulted in a Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Studies (Literature, Women's Studies) and an M.A. in German. Her work as a translator includes a collection of early to modern German crime stories, a collection of Bavarian folktales, a short story anthology, and a children's book. She is a German teacher at a regional high school, where she is trying to instill a passion for German culture, language and literature in her students.



**Trauma and Beyond:

Dr. Wirtz will explore the trauma of violence as *existence in extremis*, a meaning disorder that undermines one's trust in the world and in oneself. When pushed into an awareness of one's own nothingness, when the ego's central role is powerfully exploded, the previous psychic structure disintegrated and the

connection to other human beings broken, this crack in one's worldview can also become an opening, a potential catalyst for a transformation of consciousness, precipitating a movement from Chaos to New Order, a process of wounding and awakening, of dying and becoming.

Ursula Wirtz, Ph.D. has a degree in philosophy and literature from the University of Munich, lic.phil degree as clinical and anthropological psychologist from the University of Zürich, and holds a diploma from the C.G. Jung Institute-Zürich. She is a training analyst of the International School of Analytical Psychology (ISAP Zürich), and is Academic Chair of ISAP Zürich's Jungian Odyssey Committee. Dr. Wirtz has taught and lectured internationally. She has numerous publications on trauma, ethics and spirituality.



Beyond Echo and Cassandra: Finding the Voice of Inner Authority

Despite outer accomplishments, many people still struggle inwardly to “find our voices.” To do so is a psychological process of developing inner authority and learning to express it authentically. Inner authority is the ability to genuinely value our own thoughts, feelings, perceptions and intuition, leading to self-trust, agency and the ability to be the authors of our own lives. It is a quality that emerges during what Jung called individuation, the process of

psychological development that leads toward wholeness.

In this presentation, the Greek myths of Echo and Cassandra, lived by contemporary individuals and visible in Jungian analysis, will be used to illustrate the loss and recovery of the authentic inner voice. We will draw upon insights from Jungian psychology, as well as images from western alchemy and Kundalini yoga to explore how the voice of inner authority may develop.

Kaitryn Sheehan Wertz, M.Ed., LPC, is a certified Jungian Analyst in private practice in Broomfield, Colorado, with a thirty-year background as a psychotherapist, consultant, workshop leader and group process facilitator. She is a graduate of the Inter-Regional Society for Jungian Analysts (IRSJA) and a member of the C.G. Jung Institute of Colorado.



“The Twelve Huntsmen”: A Tale of Separation and Reconnection with the Feminine

Fairy tales characteristically take us out of a purely personal and complex world of psychology and lead us to a profoundly educational encounter with archetypal images. They provide descriptions of how primitive and collective forms of psychic energy are activated and move deep within us. The 12 Huntsmen (Grimm, 1992) presents an archetypal drama, a symbolic telling of a

love story and the separation and reunion of the masculine and feminine in the collective unconscious. It describes how the masculine can fall under a powerful influence and abandon the feminine, its own true love; and how that abandoned feminine, the anima, steadfastly and cleverly creates the opportunity for a heart-full reunion. This simple tale instructs us in the possibilities and the power by which the feminine brings about greater consciousness, psychic integration, and a sense of wholeness within.

Mark T. Palmer, PhD is a licensed clinical psychologist in private practice in Denver and a Training Candidate at the C. G. Jung Institute of Colorado. Mark holds Ph.D.'s in Clinical Psychology and Interpersonal Communication. For the past 10 years he has studied and worked as a Jungian psychologist. His special interests have led him to study and write about the Patriarch Complex and the Owl Goddess.
